Abstract (for dissemination)	BEAMS strategic goal is the development of an advanced, integrated management system which enables energy efficiency in buildings and special infrastructures from a holistic perspective (e.g., considering the indoors areas, the public spaces around the facility and the interaction of the overall compound with the grid and urban network outside it). In order to achieve this goal it has been proposed an architecture that relies on the interoperability gateway OGEMA (developed within in Smart House Smart Grid project and the German national project Modellstadt Manheim), which will be further extended and adapted to the requirements of more complex scenarios. In addition, it will be developed within the project a Facility Management Environment (FAME), where it will reside the intelligence needed to coordinate control strategies to increase energy efficiency across an entire facility.
	This document presents a common view of BEAMS project scope as well as an overview of the architecture envisioned for BEAMS system, its main components and key stakeholders involved. From these concepts, several scenarios and use-cases of interest were defined and used as the starting point for the definition of the overall BEAMS system requirements.

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1 Introduction

1.1 Purpose and scope of the Document

The purpose of this document is to present a summary of the initial activities performed during the first work package of the project as well as presenting the results obtained.

A commonly shared understanding of the goals and scope of the project is required for its success. The first activities triggered the discussion and agreement among all partners regarding the project scope, scenarios and use cases of interest and finally the definition of the requirements for the main components of the BEAMS architecture.

The results of these activities, which are presented in this document, are the basis for the design and development work packages of the project.

1.2 Structure of the Document

The document includes a first section with a basic summary of the project scope and objectives. This section is supposed to be the basic information to be used internally when presenting the project within each organisation of the BEAMS consortium.

The following sections are intended to present a description of the main steps followed during the definition of the project scope, scenario and use-cases of interest.

The requirements section provides a description of the specific tools and methodologies used to derive requirements for each of the main components of the BEAMS architecture.

Last but not least, a first draft description of the pilot sites is presented and a methodology for testing and quality assurance is proposed.



2 Project Summary

2.1 Introduction

BEAMS strategic goal is the development of an **advanced**, **integrated** management system which enables energy efficiency in buildings and special infrastructures from a **holistic perspective**. The project will include an **open interoperability gateway** that will allow the management of diverse, **heterogeneous sources and loads**.

BEAMS is a **user driven**, **demonstration oriented** project, where evidence of the energy and CO_2 savings achieved by the project's technologies will be collected.

By means of a decentralised architecture, BEAMS will enable new mechanisms to extend current building management systems and achieve higher degrees of efficiency. **BEAMS strategic goal will be to define and develop an advanced, integrated management system for buildings and special infrastructures of public use.** This system will rely on an open interoperability gateway that will allow the control of already identified heterogeneous subsystems acting as sources and loads in such facilities. Some of them typically present nowadays in spaces of public use, such as public lighting or ventilation and air conditioning; some others, to become widely adopted in the next years, such as renewable sources or electric vehicles.

It is also within the scope of the project to develop the development of an integrated FAcility Management Environment (FAME) that provides a facility manager the right decision support and simulation tools required for coordinated common control strategies to increase the energy use efficiency across an entire facility.

The solution proposed will not only support the human operator of the building or facility to achieve higher efficiency in the use of energy, but it will also open new opportunities to third parties -such as Energy Service Companies (ESCO), utilities and grid operators- needing and willing to interact with BEAMS management system through the interoperability gateway in order to improve the quality and efficiency of the service –both inside and outside the perimeter of the facility.



2.2 Objectives of the Project

The BEAMS project and its consortium are geared towards addressing the previously described challenge and mission in order to provide an innovative integrated energy management system.

BEAMS strategic goal is the development of an **advanced**, **integrated**, management system which enables energy efficiency in buildings and special infrastructures from a **holistic** perspective. To that end, the subsystems in such facilities that are consuming or producing energy, which nowadays normally count with their own Monitoring and Control (M&C) solutions will be connected through an open interface among themselves and to external third party applications. This will enable the design and development of higher level applications that will be able to take control of the energy processes ongoing considering the different requirements of each subsystem.

At the same time, the use of such gateway will open new opportunities to ESCOs and grid operators, who could negotiate different Service Level Agreements (SLA) to affect the normal operation of the subsystems and address specific quality of service and critical situations.

Current industrial access to electricity already considers the interruptibility of the service as a demand management tool –a rough one indeed- to give a rapid and efficient response to the needs of the electricity system in emergency situations. It consists of reducing the active power demanded to a required residual power level, in response to a power reduction order issued by the main grid operator, to consumers subscribed to this service.

The deployment of the open gateway proposed by BEAMS will provide a more granular and accurate tool to respond to emergency situations without actually interrupting the service. In this way, to avoid an overload, the grid operator could request to reduce the consumption from public lighting, or HVAC systems (Heating, Ventilating, and Air Conditioning); it could request the generation of energy in the case of facilities with their own generators, or the access to previously stored energy, etc. On the other hand, the more granular solution proposed by BEAMS also enables a finer control of different QoS levels for the different services managed by ESCOs.

BEAMS will validate this approach through the development of a facility management environment that will be deployed in two high profile pilot sites:

- The Stadium of the **Football Club Barcelona** in Spain.
- The campus of the **University of Salento** in Italy.

The general goals described above can be specified into a set of concrete scientific and technical objectives of the project:

- 1. Specification of **requirements**, **use-cases and architectures** associated to scenarios of efficient energy management, including subsystems (e.g. lighting, HVAC, generation, vehicle recharge, storage), local energy grids, interface to external grids and integration of dedicated services and applications via local and wide area communication networks.
- 2. **Definition of common ontology, information models and interfaces** to facilitate industry deployment and adoption by end-user, operators, designers, ESCOs, and system integrators.
- 3. Inclusion of new **Greening Energy Positive Tools** as Renewable Sources (RES) and Electrical Vehicles (EV) to locally balance the load inside the considered system and support the grid.



- Development of an open gateway to interact with ICT solutions from different vendors. The gateway will not only serve to the building/microgrid operator to optimise its service, but also will open new management opportunities out of the microgrid.
- 5. Design and Implementation of a **FAcility Management Environment** (FAME), which will include three different modules:
 - a. A Smart Control Algorithm with learning capabilities.
 - b. A Decision Support and Simulation tool.
 - c. An Energy Efficiency Balanced Score Card.
- 6. Validation and demonstration of the project results in two different pilot sites:
 - a. The Stadium of the Football Club Barcelona in Spain.
 - b. The campus of the University of Salento in Italy.
- Evaluation and Assessment by means of a thorough methodology of the amount of energy and CO₂ emissions saved through the deployment of BEAMS technology.

The focus of BEAMS will not be so much to develop breakthrough technologies from scratch but instead to integrate different innovative technologies so that their combined use leads to increased energy savings and emission reduction. This approach will allow having a rapid impact on the market, in the spirit of the European Economic Recovery Plan 2010-2013 (PPP in Research Areas) [1].

These objectives will be achieved during the 30 month duration of the project by performing the work specified in the 8 scientific work packages, the dissemination and exploitation work package and the project management work package detailed in the work programme. In order to assess the project success, a number of deliverables will be associated to each project objective and used as measurable indicators of its level of fulfilment – see Table 1.

The ultimate goal is to achieve higher energy efficiency and optimise its usage by being able to have a global view of the different subsystems, and therefore applying common synergetic strategies to implement saving policies. Moreover, self-generation from renewable sources– and the related balance problem in the microgrid– will be studied as a main way to reduce CO_2 emissions. Last but not least, interaction with third party services to increase the robustness of the grid and the Quality of Service –e.g., exchanging information with the utilities or letting an ESCO manage the energy processes within a facility-, or the access to valuable information to adapt the behaviour of the building management system –e.g., exploiting weather forecasts– will be assessed.



3 BEAMS domain model

3.1 BEAMS system scope definition – Initial proposal

Before the definition of use-cases, in this section we present a brief description of the scope of BEAMS project. This vision will be used as reference for the use-cases identification and definition of further sections of this document.

The use-case modelling methodology used in this document is based on the concepts presented in [¹]. The following Figure illustrates the activities involved in the development of a use-case model, where group activities are shown in grey and are focused on preparing the groundwork for the evolution of the use-case model and its supporting supplementary specification by establishing the vision, scoping the system, addressing areas of uncertainty and instability in the requirements definition, and consolidating and reviewing the use-case model as a whole.



Figure 2: Use-case modelling process

In this section, however, we focus in the first three steps intended to establish a common vision and system limits for the project. Use-cases definition can help to further define the system boundaries and in general, generate a clearer and common vision of the project among all the partners involved.

3.1.1 OGEMA framework in the scope of BEAMS project

The candidate architecture should follow the natural extension of the OGEMA approach developed in Smart House Smart Grid project² and the German national project Modellstadt Manheim³. In this way, instead of having households, we are having buildings, or control rooms managing a number of subsystems. Instead of having electrical appliances as main loads, we will have subsystems as HVAC, lighting, water – hot water and watering, electrical vehicles (EV), etc. And in addition we are introducing as greening positive tools photovoltaic (PV) and EV – that is two new resources to consider the storage and production of energy. In summary:

- Households→ buildings or control rooms
- Appliances (resources) → subsystems

Each building should have similar capabilities as the one provided by OGEMA nowadays e.g. management of loads based on variable tariffs, scheduling, storage of measurements, etc (check original OGEMA framework hereafter)



Figure 3: Current OGEMA building blocks architecture

The extension of OGEMA from its application in the residential market to more complex scenarios such as big facilities (e.g., sport facilities, university campus, industrial environment, etc) is possible due to its inherent modular architecture as well as its current support to international standards such as IEC 61850 or CIM. Requirements regarding these complex scenarios will be well considered from the beginning in order to properly extend OGEMA framework. This framework will have to be extended:

- In order to deploy particular communication drivers for the subsystems to be controlled. It might be necessary to develop and deploy new drivers in OGEMA besides those already implemented (e.g. Z-wave, ZigBee, etc).
- In order to deploy new resources (the subsystems).
- In order to deploy new applications.
 - To include new applications in order to allow the introduction of greening positive tools such as PV and EV.

• To distribute the intelligent control strategies for the overall facility (or group of buildings or control rooms).

This last point is critical in order to obtain coordinated responses. Most probably, the subsystems that would need to adapt its behaviour in response to a certain situation will not be hosted in the same room, therefore, they will not depend on the same gateway, and cooperation at a higher level must be granted.

The following Figure illustrates how the OGEMA+ framework should look like:

This OGEMA+ framework will have to be customized to each building – e.g., if a building is not controlling any HVAC, it makes no sense to include its related drivers and resources in OGEMA.

Besides controlling several different subsystems within a facility, the new gateway (OGEMA+ platform) will be able to interface with a number of third parties:

- In order to provide information to the apps running in OGEMA: The pricebased management app will have to access the utility variable tariffs (or receive them).
- In order to accept requests from the utility for energy power reduction to avoid a blackout (emergency power reduction app).
- In order to implement higher level control strategies involving more than one building (SCALC-execution layer)
 - That is where overriding capabilities as well as certain priority levels are needed.

All in all, FAME, will be just a third party application accessing OGEMA (through the SCALC module) to run a global facility management system. Obviously, FAME will have the advantage of being able to affect the design of OGEMA, and deploy the needed application to grant coordinated monitoring and control.



3.1.2 BEAMS project architecture

The following Figure illustrates a high level system architecture that could be used as starting point for the discussion and agreement of BEAMS system scope:



Figure 5: BEAMS high level system architecture (draft)

From this architecture there can be derived several important aspects regarding the scope of the project and BEAMS system limits. The main important aspects are listed below:

- From the point of view of the architecture, requirements should be defined in a first step as independent of the pilot sites, and then try to map the constraints of each site (the configuration proposed is transferable to both the stadium and the campus).
- Within a single facility there can be many different energy generating or consuming subsystems. These subsystems can have an impact within a single building, or a building and its surroundings. For instance, as we can find in FCB stadium facility, lighting of the stadium and its surrounding is controlled by different control rooms spread across the stadium building. This might imply the deployment of one or several instances of OGEMA within a single building or facility.
- One OGEMA instance will be the gateway between one or many subsystems within a building or facility e.g. HVAC, lighting, etc and FAME. Each of these subsystems can be already in place in the facility or might be deployed in the near future, but in any case they will be interfaced with OGEMA through the specific communication drivers developed for these subsystems as components of the OGEMA gateway. Communication between OGEMA instances and FAME will be granted through the communications infrastructure already in place in the facility, or newly infrastructure to be deployed within the scope of the project.
- There can be third party actors e.g., a utility, ESCO, etc that could interact with the BEAMS system of a facility through its OGEMA gateways. In fact, FAME can be considered also as a third party from the point of view of OGEMA since FAME will have access to OGEMA instances in the same way third parties have. In other words, FAME should be seen as a third party system accessing OGEMA.



 Even though is not yet completely defined, communication interface between different OGEMA instances and FAME and even with third-party actors might be implemented based on enterprise service buses (ESB). Regarding communication with third-party actors international initiatives such as OpenADR might be taken into account, although this is not the main focus of the project.

Besides OGEMA, FAME will play a vital role within BEAMS architecture since it is the module where it will be included the intelligence needed to coordinate common control strategies across an entire facility. The following section presents a high level description of FAME as well as its main components.

3.1.2.1 FAME architecture

Figure 5 presents a first approach for the internal architecture of FAME, where it can be observed the main modules and interfaces between them to be developed. The three main modules that will be developed within FAME are listed below:

- Smart Control Algorithm with learning capabilities (SCALC): This module will be the responsible for providing the modelling of situation/context capabilities to the system. By defining known situation/context within a facility and enabling the system to learn or detect new ones, a better and optimized control of the entire facility can be provided at any moment.
- Decision Support and Simulation system (DAS): Within this module will be
 provided a simple and user-friendly interface to present the human operator
 all the information obtained from the subsystems and devices in the facility. It
 will be developed as a tool to support the decision making process,
 presenting a high level view of the state of an entire facility as well as
 enabling low level control capabilities to manage the entire facility.
- Energy Efficiency Balanced Score Card (EBS): This module will be a particular instantiation of a BSC with a focus on Energy Efficiency. The objective is to provide the human operator with a number of indicators on how the system is behaving. These indicators will help the end-user to assess the suitability of each of the strategies and policies planned and deployed through the DAS. In the same way, jointly with the simulation tool, it will be possible to evaluate the investments to be made in order to achieve specific objectives (and their turnover).

Additionally, some common modules will be developed within FAME so that previous modules can use them to implement their basic functionalities. Two modules already identified are:

- User interface layer (UI): It was already mentioned that FAME-DAS will provide a simple user interface. However, in practice all modules within FAME could have some kind of UI module through which a facility manager can interact with the system to perform concrete tasks related to each of these modules. In consequence, following some good software development practices, all common UI functionalities will be developed within one single module that could be re-used by other components within FAME.
- **Data Access Layer:** This module will be integrated by a local data base in FAME as well as the proper data access layer that would enable all components of FAME to access the data of an entire facility.

Finally, once a clearer vision of BEAMS architecture has been presented, some of its main components, and the system scope, the following sections present further ideas and guidelines necessary for a clearer and precise BEAMS use-cases definition.



3.1.3 BEAMS project terminology

Following we present some concepts that have been agreed by all partners within the consortium and that represent the basic terminology to be used when defining the use-cases for the project. These main concepts are:

- **Gateway:** A gateway (within the scope of BEAMS project) is a platform allowing the communication between the different energy generating and consuming subsystems (e.g., lighting, HVAC, PV panels, etc) and the high level facility monitoring and control platform (in this case FAME). OGEMA platform plays the role of a gateway in the BEAMS architecture.
- **Communication driver:** As stated in OGEMA documentation, different real energy generating and consuming subsystems (and particularly their control modules) can be interfaced, monitored and controlled accordingly by OGEMA platform. This is achieved due to the development and deployment of software components within OGEMA that allow the communication with these subsystems. These Sw components are called communication drivers.

3.1.4 BEAMS system – Main actors (stakeholders)

The next step towards the definition of use-cases is the analysis and presentation of the main actors or stakeholders involved in the interaction with BEAMS system. In general, an actor can be an external role, human or device, that interacts with the system. In the case of BEAMS project, the main actors identified are listed below:

- Facility manager
- Utility-Energy trading company (market operator)
- Utility-Energy DSO (Distribution System Operator)
- Weather information/forecast providers
- Other third parties (e.g., ESCOs, subsystems operators, etc)
- EV owner (end user)
- Energy generating and consuming systems

A detailed description for each actor is presented in the following tables:

Table 2 BEAMS actor - Facility Manager

Actor	Role, description and goals
Facility manager	This actor could be a facility owner, third-party company or a person responsible for the operation of all the different systems within a facility (e.g., HVAC, lighting, etc). In case of a third-party company, it could provide additional services to the facility owner (e.g., maintenance, cleaning services, etc). From the point of view of BEAMS project, the facility manager is the end-user, and can be seen as a human operator interacting with BEAMS system through FAME user interface.

Table 3 BEAMS actor – Utility-energy trading company

Actor	Role, description and goals
Utility-Energy trading company (market operator)	This actor represents the electricity, gas or in general the energy supplier of a facility. Normally, this actor is responsible for energy trading in wholesale markets and its retail trading
	(energy sell) to end customers. Depending on legislations of each country this actor might be responsible for billing to end customers (sometimes based on energy consumption data obtained by metering devices owned by a utility-DSO company). DSO will be considered as an external actor to BEAMS system and for the purpose of the project this actor will be



implemented as a set of scripts that can be used to simulate a
bidirectional communication between BEAMS system and
"utility systems". For example, "utility scripts" will be used to
simulate an open market with variable tariff.

Table 4 BEAMS actor – Utility-Energy DSO (Distribution System Operator)

Actor	Role, description and goals
Utility-Energy DSO (Distribution System Operator)	This actor represents the electricity, gas or in general energy company normally in charge of managing energy generation and transmission systems.
	Depending on legislations of each country a DSO might be responsible for energy consumption reduction requests; it is the owner of electricity meters installed in a user facility, etc. DSO will be considered as an external actor to BEAMS system and for the purpose of the project this actor will be implemented as a set of scripts that can be used to simulate a bidirectional communication between BEAMS system and "utility systems". For example, "utility scripts" will be used to simulate the transmission of emergency control signals to end customers.

Table 5 BEAMS actor - Weather information/forecast providers		
Actor	Role, description and goals	
Weather information / forecast providers	This actor represents another external system interacting with BEAMS system in order to provide update weather information and/or weather forecast that can be used internally by BEAMS to perform energy optimizations. If this kind of systems can not be available at the moment of performing the field trials for BEAMS project, weather forecast providers will be implemented as a set of scripts that will be used to simulate a bidirectional communication with BEAMS system.

Other third parties (e.g., ESCOs, subsystems operators, etc)	There can be a variety of different external systems besides those already mentioned that can interact with BEAMS system. Some examples of actors that can play an interesting role within the scope of BEAMS project are ESCOs or specific subsystems operators (e.g., HVAC, PV panels, etc) that could take profit of BEAMS to interact with their systems, monitoring and controlling them remotely.

Actor	Role, description and goals
Energy generating and consuming systems	These systems can be seen as actors that can be monitored and controlled by BEAMS system. There can be many different systems that are already in place in an infrastructure (or would be in place in the short term) e.g. HVAC, lighting, PV panels, EVs etc. These systems could have (or not) control systems, or in the best case there is a Building Management System (BMS) through which OGEMA can interact with, and gain access/control the different subsystems of the facility. Within the scope of the project, in those cases where there is not any BMS or control interface for the subsystems of a facility, these will be deployed by the project consortium.

3.2 BEAMS pilot sites characterization and needs

In order to understand the characteristics of the pilot sites where BEAMS system will be deployed, we propose to follow some ideas used in the FP7 project SportE2 for the characterization of sport facilities and development of an energy efficiency system for this type of facility⁴. In this project, several different pilot sites surveys where performed in order to obtain the following data:

- Characterisation of all energy sources used at the facility.
- Identification of the type of energy contract in place with the energy suppliers.
- Identification of the functional areas present at the facility in question.
- A characterisation of the energy flows at the facility.
- Identification of the energy consuming systems (or loads) in all the areas of the facility (devices are identified, counted and inspected). Possible controllable systems, control equipments required and actions can be derived from this survey.
- Current management and energy efficiency mechanisms used by the facility managers, and what they main requirements are.
- Identification of possible energy efficiency goals a facility manager is willing to obtain with the deployment of a system such as BEAMS.
- Additionally, it would be important to know the kind of communication infrastructure already in place in each of the pilot sites.

For an initial survey (of a sport facility), SportE² project proposed a survey intended to answer the following questions. Following these ideas, we present an initial list with questions adapted to the goals of BEAMS project.

- 1. General features of the structure: when the structure was built, does the facility have a building energy rating certificate?
- 2. What does the overall energy picture look like?
- 3. Total Energy consumption data and energy consumption per each typology of facilities within the whole pilot site (e.g., ice skating facility, football

stadium, offices, etc), and systems that consume that energy (ventilation, heating, lighting, cooling, hot water, acoustic protection, etc.

- 4. Detailed technical characteristics and operation of the energy consuming systems of the whole pilot site e.g., HVAC system in place and scheduled operation, lighting control in place, etc.
- 5. Are there renewable energy sources or any other DER sources in the facility? Technical characteristics and operation schedules available?
- 6. Facilities' user characteristics. Can be extracted predictable patterns of use of each facility within each pilot site?
- 7. Within the analysed facilities, are there any energy efficient policies / energy conservation measures that have been put in place? Which ones? Is it possible to measure and verify the associated energy impact?
- 8. Are there sub or smart metering systems in place or does facility manager just receive one bulk energy bill?
- 9. When corresponding, is it energy generated by renewable energy systems sold or used internally within the pilot site?
- 10. Are there any kinds of energy storage systems available in the facility?
- 11. Are environmental parameters monitored? Is there any infrastructure already in place?
- 12. Do facility managers already have an idea of what they would like to improve with energy efficiency? Example of problematic issue that facility managers want to address with the project.
- 13. Is possible to create awareness among customers in order to apply ICT system able to reduce the overall energy consumptions?
- 14. For energy supply, which kind of contract does the facility manager have?, flat rate tariffs?, or any rewards for peak shaving activities?
- 15. Possible savings that the structure could achieve?
- 16. Is there any lack of incentives to implement energy efficiency devices and encourage efficiency among customers that could be improved?
- 17. Is there any communication infrastructure already within the facility? Can this infrastructure be used by BEAMS subsystems (and particularly OGEMA instances and FAME)?

Answering these questions will certainly help in the definition of use-cases of interests for the project and in particular for the facility managers of both pilots sites. Additionally, it will be helpful in the identification of possible areas or subsystems to be improved and that can be controlled by an OGEMA, and in the end to be integrated within BEAMS architecture.

A clear vision of the characteristics of each of the pilot sites as well as its facility manager needs will be very important in the definition of specific use-cases adapted to the characteristics of each of the pilot sites of the project.

Despite at the beginning of the project there are not answers for all questions previously listed, some initial cases can be proposed and improved in further iterations as more details about each pilot site and its sub-systems arrive. The result of this process is presented along the following sections where we provide an initial list of high level scenarios and use-cases of interest for BEAMS project.

It is important to highlight that the result of the each pilot site survey and the definition of all subsystems to be integrated within the BEAMS architecture in both cases, will be provided as an annex to this document (in month 7 of the project).

4 BEAMS scenarios

The identification and definition of scenarios and use cases are the first steps towards the architecture design of BEAMS project. Along this section, we present the results of the analysis performed regarding key scenarios (high level scenarios) and use-cases definition for the project.

First, we present a summary table with the main scenarios identified, and then we provide a detailed description each of these scenarios. These scenarios will be later mapped to use-cases proposed by the all partners of the consortium.

5.6 Use-cases workflow – Summary

From the scenarios and use-cases analysis performed in the previous sections, it is possible to derive several workflow diagrams that present in a summarized and graphical way the main interaction between the different components of the BEAMS system.

The workflows presented below have not been created using any particular standard or technology, they simply have been develop to summarize the main concepts gathered through the use-case analysis as well as being a reference point and possibly a tool to trigger the discussion during the requirements analysis stage.

In order to better understand the information presented in these workflows, the following concepts should be taken into account:

- Each BEAM's architectural module relevant to the key ideas presented in each workflow is presented as coloured boxes. All components of BEAMS architecture are not necessarily present in all workflows.
- Within each coloured box is presented the main flow required to provide a result to be presented to the facility manager or to be provided to other BEAMS component.
- FAME components (presented also coloured boxes) can be seen as independent modules that can interact among them or other components of



BEAMS such as OGEMA. This allows seeing clearly the internal flow within a FAME module as well as the interaction within different FAME modules.

Interaction between FAME and OGEMA is supported through the corresponding mechanism already presented in the architecture section (namely an ESB).

5.6.1 Workflow – Monitoring of energy consumption

The following workflow illustrates the main steps described in use-case UC-001 for the energy consumption monitoring of an entire facility.

5.6.2 Workflow – Facility energy consumption control/optimization

The following workflow illustrates the main ideas presented through all use-cases within the scenario SC-002 (facility energy consumption control/optimization). The scenario SC-002 covers also use-cases where optimizations can be performed locally in OGEMA. However, this workflow focuses on those cases where an interaction between OGEMA and FAME is required. For example, the workflow illustrates those cases where a new or unknown situation/context is detected and, in consequence, new control schedule plans should be generated in OGEMA (possibly based on some requirements introduced by the facility manager as well as local information).

5.6.3 Workflow – Facility advanced control/optimization supported by FAME

The following workflow illustrates the main ideas presented through all use-cases within the scenario SC-003 (facility energy consumption advanced control/optimization supported by FAME) and SC-005 (simulation of situation/contexts not available in an existing deployment).

In both cases, the process can start with the facility manager defining a situation/context that can be simulated and assessed within FAME, and depending on the results obtained, the new operational requirements are sent from FAME to OGEMA so that the overall facility operation is affected.

It is important to highlight that the scenarios and use-cases provided have been authored to be as general as possible. From these scenarios and use-cases can be later derived specific use-cases adapted to the particular characteristics of the pilot sites to be used in BEAMS project, FCB Stadium facilities and UNISAL campus facilities.



6 Requirements Analysis

6.1 Methodology

Gathering the requirements from all stake-holders in a project is a key success factor. The requirements not only describe different aspects of a project but they also help to identify conflicting features in early stages. Such an important step – that identifies and affects the overall outcome of the project - is worth investing considerable efforts and utilizing proper tool. Considering this, we have chosen Volere methodology (1) for describing and managing requirements which we have extended with a consecutive prioritization phase. In the following, we discuss the rationale for using Volere and we describe the classification categories and the process.

6.1.1 Requirement Elicitation

The Volere methodology is not new to some of the project partners. It was first used by a number of the project partners in EMMA project where it was used mainly because of its simplicity. It helped project partners to describe, formalize and track the project requirements in an explicit and unambiguous manner. Besides being a success in the EMMA project, the Volere methodology was selected for the following three reasons:

- 1. The Volere methodology requires simple steps to identify and formalize the requirements in an unambiguous manner.
- 2. The Volere methodology provides an easy process to track and evaluate the progress of the project.
- 3. A number of the project partners have already experience with the Volere methodology. Hence, they did not experience an extra learning effort.

The consequent application of the Volere methodology is not only useful in the initial phases of the project for specifying requirements but it is also helpful in specifying a reference point for the later stages. During the use case analysis, for example, it can be used to ensure that different use cases cover different aspects of the requirements and that all important requirements are covered by them. During the implementation and management, it can be used to track and evaluate the progress of the individual work packages and the overall project. Besides being efficient and easy to use, the Volere methodology provides a mechanism for all partners to specify the requirements in a standard format. Thereby, specifying additional context of a requirement such as the rationale and the acceptance criteria for every requirement helps to build a common understanding of the overall system. Furthermore, defining priorities helps to clarify the focus of the project.

6.1.2 Requirement Prioritization

In order to prioritize requirements, the project consortium has introduced three different classes of priorities. These classes range from **five (high priority)** over **two (medium priority)** to **one (low priority)** and the consortium has defined them as follows:

- 1. **High**: Requirements in this class are either realizing a key innovation of the project or they are needed to realize it. These requirements are necessary to achieve the goals of the project.
- 2. **Medium**: Requirements in this class are not necessary to realize a key innovation but they are necessary or very helpful to realize the application prototypes. These requirements are important to the application developer.



3. Low: Requirements in this class are neither realizing a key innovation nor necessary for the application prototypes. However, in a broader context – possibly beyond the scope of the project – they may be important.

The implementation of requirements defined through the Volere tool, and in general use cases and scenarios within the scope of the project will be subject to further consideration, including the consideration of efforts and resources within the project as well as capabilities of local hardware at the pilot sites.

As a consequence, for the success of the project, it is essential to realize the requirements with high priority. With respect to providing thorough support for application developers, it is important to realize the requirements with medium priority as well. The requirements with low priority, however, are not of immediate relevance for the project. However, their realization may provide additional features or benefits for applications or users that should be considered after all requirements of the other two classes have been implemented successfully.

In order to give all stake-holders and interested parties an insight into the prioritization process, the consortium has not only assigned categories to each requirement but it decided to include the main rationale for this classification in this document. Besides from being informative, this can be helpful in later stages of the project where unforeseeable issues may require the introduction of new requirements or changes to existing ones.

6.2 **Tool**

Aiming at defining an optimum and complete list of requirements, a web tool based on the Volere methodology was developed originally during the EMMA project and has been defined since. This web tool has facilitated the definition, the validation and the prioritization of the BEAMS requirements.

For security reasons, the access to the web tool has been restricted to authorized users. Anyone can fill in the registration form to request a valid user name and password (c.f. Figure 10). This request is processed by the administrator who decides who must be granted access to the website.

If the administrator approves the request, then, an email with the user name and password is sent to the requester. From that moment, the user will be able to access the BEAMS requirements definition website (c.f. Figure 11).

Access to the web tool is granted after a successful identification on the system. The application allows the administrator to control the status of the validation process from the initial definition to the final list of requirements passing through the required validation and revision status.

6.2.1 Specification Process

The overall process of Volere as supported by the web tool is depicted in Figure 12. After an initial specification of requirements, the users can specify conflicts, dependencies and objections. After specifying them, they can iteratively revise the specification and identify additional issues until it is free of conflicts, dependencies and objections. The result will constitute the final list of requirements. The following subsections briefly outline the individual steps.

6.2.2 Requirement Definition

In this first stage all the requirements needed to accomplish the project objectives must be defined. These will be refined in future stages. The most useful information and the main functionalities at this stage available at the home page are (c.f. Figure 14):

- Help: An external link to Volere requirements specification template.
- List of requirements: The list of requirements with some additional options.
 - Filtering options: The list of requirements filtered by id. type and/or filtered by author.
 - Expand table: Show/hide some columns, displaying more or less information about the requirement.
- Requirements management: Modification options for requirements.
 - View a requirement
 - Edit a requirement (only available for the author)
 - Delete a requirement (only available for the author)
- **Requirements tracing**: After the first validation, a new service is made available for keeping track of all the requirements history.
- Export to CSV: Export all requirements to a CSV file for external handling.
- Insert a new requirement: Opens a new window (c.f. Figure 14) to allow adding a new requirement. All the fields are required except for "Comments" which is optional. The required fields are:
 - ID: The scope of this requirement (BAF, DCP, etc.). Appended by an automatically generated sequential number, this ID uniquely identifies each requirement. This ID will be generated after the requirement has been added (c.f. Figure 15).
 - **Description**: A one sentence statement which describes the intention of the requirement.
 - **Type**: The type of the requirement as defined by Volere.
 - **Rationale**: A justification of the requirement.
 - **Acceptance criteria**: A measurement of the requirement for further verification that the solution matches the original requirement.
 - **Priority**: The importance for the customer of successfully implementing the requirement.

6.2.3 Requirement Validation

After the initial definition of requirements, the validation process begins. All the requirements should be approved by all the users. At this stage, conflicts and dependencies between requirements must be detected. Furthermore, any objection must be pointed out (c.f. Figure 16):

• **Dependency:** Requirements that have some dependency on other requirements.



- **Conflict:** Requirements that cannot be implemented if another requirement is implemented or a conflict due to an insufficient definition of the requirement.
- **Objection:** A reason or argument offered in disagreement, opposition, refusal or disapproval of the requirement.

6.2.4 Requirement Revision

All the dependencies, conflicts and objections encountered by the experts during the validation stage must be revised and solved. However, if the authors do not agree with the validator's opinion, then they can make use of the "Reviser's comments" option for pointing out their disagreement or clarifying the intention of the requirement. Note that only the authors of the requirements that have to be revised are able to add comments to the dependency, conflict or objection.

The checkboxes in "Requirements revised" column and "Validator's approval" column help the users to check the status of the revision and together with the possibility of adding comments facilitate the interaction and communication between the author and the validator. For security reasons, the checkboxes on the "Requirements revised" column are only enabled for the authors of the requirements who have also enabled the possibility of adding comments. Moreover, for the same reason, the checkboxes on the "Validator's approval" column are enabled only for the author of the validation.

The revision process consists of four steps:

- First, the authors should identify which requirements have been objected to or are involved in any conflict or dependency.
- Second and after analyzing the validator's opinion:



- The author may agree with the validator and proceed to modify or delete the requirement.
- The author may disagree with the validator, therefore he/she should make appropriate comments trying to clarify the requirement with a better explanation or justify the intention of the requirement.
- Third, the author should mark the checkbox of the requirement as revised.

Finally, the validator should be aware of the revised requirements and approve the actions taken by the author for resolving the dependency/conflict/objection.

It is possible to review the history of a requirement as illustrated below (c.f. Figure 18).

The following sections present the results of the requirements definition process. 7 Requirements – Architectural Principles (WP2)

7.1 Overview

The definition and development of all components of BEAMS project starts with the agreement and definition of a common architecture for all systems within the project. The reference architecture will enable the design and development of all energy efficiency management components, including the data models and interoperability interfaces between BEAMS components as well as BEAMS and external actors, smart grids and services.

7.2 Requirements

A brief description of a draft architecture proposal for BEAMS project was presented when analyzing all scenarios and use-cases for the project. In this architecture it can be seen all main components and interfaces between the different BEAMS components. Since several "Architectural Principles" requirements are related to each of these components, interfaces between them, etc, in this section we will organize the requirements presentation according to the following sub-categories:

To enable the integration of PV and EV optimization in spaces of public use will be one of the main objectives of the work package WP3, either if real infrastructure is already in place or not. The technical and economical impact model of PV and EV in the energy management of any facility should be one of the main outputs of this work package, so that the requirements defined and presented in this section will be the starting point for all activities aiming at achieving these objectives.

9 Requirements – Interoperability Gateway (WP4)

9.1 Overview

The interoperability gateway OGEMA is one of the main components of BEAMS system. Despite OGEMA has been developed and used mainly in residential scenarios, its modular and scalable architecture can be extended to cope with the requirements of energy management in bigger and more complex scenarios such as the FCB stadium or UNISAL campus.

It is a complex task to adapt the OGEMA platform to the requirements of energy management in buildings, mainly because it will have to be integrated to current systems already deployed in a facility (e.g. a BMS system), new sources and loads should be taken into account (e.g. EV and PV systems) and finally integrating OGEMA with the facility management environment. At the same time the platform to be developed should be independent of any particular site characteristics, maximizing in this way the scalability and replicability of the solution.

9.2 Requirements

The requirements listed hereafter cover the main functionalities (at a high level) that the OGEMA+ platform should have in order to achieve the objectives of the work package WP4, and, in general, contribute to the overall BEAMS project objectives. The requirements presented cover a broad range of requirement types such as functional and non-functional requirement.

FAME will interact with all OGEMA instances within a facility (getting data from them as well as sending control commands or any other data) in order to provide the facility manager an updated view of the facility at any moment.

10.2 Requirements

The requirements defined for FAME cover at a high level the functionalities that this module should have as well as aspects related to usability, maintainability and many others. Since FAME is at the same time composed of several different subsystems, it is important to provide a high level view of the overall system but also a detailed view of what each module should do and the interaction between the modules.

11 Pilot sites definition

As part of the scenarios, use-cases and requirement definition phases within work package WP1, several visits were organized to each of the pilot sites of the project. In these visits all partners got a clearer vision of each facility as well as the main subsystems that might be integrated within the project.

The following sections present a first definition of each of the test sites. However, there are still ongoing tasks where each pilot site and in particular all subsystems within each pilot site are analyzed, so that definition of all subsystems to be integrated within BEAMS project will be provided. This information will be included in an annex document.

11.1 Football Club Barcelona Stadium

The guided visits to the facilities of the FCB stadium have enabled the progress in the definition of the main systems to be integrated within BEAMS project.

In particular, an analysis of the IT and electrical infrastructure was performed, as well as the analysis of the possible equipments to be installed within the FCB facilities. The following figure shows:

- Green boxes: Optical fibre concentrator
- Blue/red boxes: Banks of transformers rooms (possible where OGEMA instances will be installed)
- Pink boxes: Backup electricity generators
- Green lines: Optical fibre links

On the FCB stadium facilities it will be required the installation of additional hardware components that allow not only monitoring but also controlling different subsystems within the facility. Despite is not yet defined the complete list of equipment to be installed, the following Figure illustrates a possible architecture and commercial equipments that could be installed in these facilities:

The communication infrastructure to be used between the different OGEMA instances distributed across the facility and FAME as shown previously, should take profit as much as possible of the current infrastructure of the facility. For those cases this is not possible, or new communication infrastructure should be deployed, this should be based on wired technologies (e.g., Ethernet, etc).

11.2 University of Salento (UNISAL) Campus

The demonstrations activities within the scope of BEAMS project will be performed in the engineering school compound of the campus. Four main buildings and areas will be considered:

- Building "La Stecca"
- Building "Corpo Y"
- o Building "Corpo O"
- o Parking lots and outdoor areas within previous buildings

The following Figure shows where these buildings are located:

Within each of these buildings several subsystems have been identified as potential systems to be integrated within BEAMS project. Several considerations have been defined after visiting these facilities. The conclusions are listed below:

Optimization of lighting systems

The optimization of the lighting system can be done taking in consideration the following factors:

- Use of the rooms:
 - TIME PROGRAMMING in the areas where the presence of people can be certainly predicted during specific time periods (e.g. classrooms, study halls) or in areas in which a certain short-term activity is scheduled (e.g. meetings or seminars).
 - PRESENCE SENSORS with timer functions installed in the restrooms.
 - INFRARED SENSORS with programmed working installed in stairwells and corridors. They will operate after a certain time (e.g. after 7 pm), according to the number of persons in transit, external light and the counting admissions system.
 - POSSIBILITY OF MANUAL CONTROL.
- External sunshine considerations:
 - o TIME PROGRAMMING according to the intensity of external light.
 - ADJUSTMENT THROUGH PHOTOCELL replacing the time programming (as a result of cost comparison).
 - POSSIBILITY OF MANUAL CONTROL.
 - SHUTTERS CONTROL automatically or manually.
- Building "CORPO O"
 - Classrooms Forecast of human presence (high priority):
 - The system will be monthly updated according to the scheduled activity (classrooms, examinations, seminars).



- The system planning in each time slot contemplates:
 - Automatic lighting switching on according to the external darkness (differently for winter and summer).
 - Automatic lighting switching on when the photocells detect uncomfortable light intensity.
 - Manual lighting switching on for a not-programmed activity.
- Laboratories and offices Forecast of human presence (medium priority)
 - Since the presence of staff is not regular during the day, the lighting system cannot be programmed. For this reason, a system able to certify the presence of people should be adequately designed. For example, an access control system at the building entrance will associate the lab/office to each identity and control the automatic lighting. In particular, the system will automatically switch the light on, depending on the time, or activate the photocells. However, the cost/benefit of the automatic lighting, previously described, should be compared with this of the manual one.
- Laboratories and offices Meeting rooms (Forecast of human presence (medium priority))
 - The lighting system could be automatically programmed for the planned activities or manually for not-scheduled ones.
- o Restrooms Forecast of human presence (low priority)
 - In these areas, a sensor will detect the human presence and turn on the lighting system.
- Corridors and stairwells Forecast of human presence (low priority): Since these are transit areas, also for security reasons, it is necessary to ensure a constant illumination.
 - If these areas are sufficiently lit by the natural light during a part of the day, the infrared system will operate from a certain time;
 - Otherwise, if the natural light is not sufficient, the infrared system will work during all day long.
- Machinery spaces Forecast of human presence (unknown priority)
 - Manual switching on the system

Optimization of HVAC systems

Adjust the system according to:

- Level of human presence
- Level of exposure to external factors (e.g. sunshine, wind)
- Indoor air quality
- Release air from the outside at night
- Level of indoor moisture
- Shutters control



• Building "Corpo O"

- Classrooms Forecast of human presence (high priority):
 - The system will be monthly updated according to the scheduled activity (classrooms, examinations, seminars).
 - The planning in each time slots contemplates:
 - Automatic switching on/off of the HVAC system
 - Additional function of the climate control according to the number of people
 - Manual switching on/off for a not-programmed activity
- Laboratories and offices Forecast of human presence (medium priority)
 - The presence of staff is not regular during the day; therefore the HVAC system cannot be programmed.
 - The access control system will certify the human presence in these spaces.
 - One possibility is to automate the climate system according to the working habits of the staff, in order to guarantee comfortable living conditions during the early hours of the day and then adapt its performance to the number of access actually recorded
 - Manual switching on/off for a not-programmed activity. Laboratories and offices - Meeting rooms (Forecast of human presence (medium priority))
- Laboratories and offices Meeting rooms Forecast of human presence (medium priority)
 - A comparison between the cost of a manual and automatic turning on/off of the system should be necessary.
- Restrooms Forecast of human presence (low priority)
 - For these areas the switching on/off of the HVAC system will be estimated in function of the occupancy.
- Corridors and stairwells Forecast of human presence (low priority):
 - For these areas the switching on/off of the HVAC system will be estimated in function of the number of presences.
- Machinery spaces:
 - Forecast of human presence (unknown)

Electrical vehicle integration

After visiting the facilities some progress was done regarding the installation of the infrastructure required for the EV management within the campus. The following Figure shows the charging station already installed in the campus as well as an example of the vehicle that will be using it.

12 Project quality and test plan

Taking into consideration all previous sections, a test plan will be proposed in order to assure the quality of any software component developed within the scope of the project.

The test plan can be considered as a component of the overall project quality plan, and its main objective is to provide the overall quality framework for the whole system development lifecycle, together with the operational guidelines for the testing activities.

12.1 BEAMS system development quality assurance

12.1.1 Development lifecycle

Within the scope of the project quality plan, it has been defined an iterative approach for the development of the whole BEAMS system. Two check points have been defined where cross-tests of the different project components will be assessed. The first one will take place by the end of the first year, where the first results of work packages WP2 and WP3 will be checked and if necessary revised. To that end, these work packages will deliver two well defined versions of their results.

In the first checkpoint, the preliminary models and architecture prototypes will be designed and used by WP4 and WP5 to start building in parallel a first version of the gateway and FAME. In a second step, the validation of the interfaces and data models in WP4 and WP5 will produce valuable feedback that will be treated in the previous WPs in order to introduce corrective actions and refine the prototypes producing the second and final version of the reference architecture and Greening Energy Positive Tools.

The second checkpoint will be in the middle of WP4 and WP5, where the results of both WPs will start to be deployed at the test sites. This will enable two different test campaigns involving different season condition. Furthermore, the feedback gathered during the first campaign will be introduced in the development of the second and final version of the gateway and FAME, which will also count with the second version of the results in WP2 and WP3.

The following section presents the methodology proposed for the development as well as the verification, validation and testing of the whole system at each of the checkpoints of the project.

12.1.2 Verification and validation methodology

In order to assure the quality of the results obtained at each of the checkpoints established within the project, in this section we present the methodology proposed to be followed for all development as well as the verification, validation and testing activities. In order to assure the quality of all development work packages (and in general of the whole project), we propose to follow a V-model approach.

The V-Model demonstrates the relationships between each phase of the development life cycle and its associated phase of testing. The following figure illustrates at a high level the development, validation and verification phases according to this model.





Figure 23: Proposed development and testing methodology to be followed in BEAMS

The use of this approach could be the base for the evaluation activities to be carried out within each work package as well as at each checkpoint of the project. This means that the whole V-model cycle is followed within each checkpoint period, and finally within WP7 in order to assure the quality of the project and assess the impact of the results obtained.

The V-model presented is mapped to the main work packages and activities within BEAMS project as follows:

- Requirements analysis: This stage of the V-model can be mapped to the main activities performed within the scope of the WP1. As a results of this work package is produced a document with the high level requirements that will be used for the development of the whole BEAMS. At validation stage, at the end of the project, these requirements will be used to validate that the whole system developed complies with the initial goals of the project.
- System analysis and design: This stage of the V-model can be mapped to the activities developed within WP2, where it will be defined the BEAMS system architecture. This will add one level of detail to the requirements defined in WP1, and settle the basis for the development of specific components of the whole BEAMS systems, as well as the interaction between these components.
- Hw/Sw components design: This stage of the V-model can be mapped to the activities performed in work packages WP3 (Green Energy Positive Tools), WP4 (Interoperability Gateway) and WP5 (Facility Management Environment). Considering the results of WP1 and WP2, each partner responsible for the development of BEAMS components will perform a HW or Sw design phase that produce the proper documentation required implementation or development team. Some examples of the results for this



stage can be Software Requirement Specification (SRS) and Software Design Descriptions (SDD) documents that clearly specify how each Hw or Sw component should be implemented. These documents will be used later in the validation phase to assure the quality of the components developed.

- **Hw/Sw implementation and unit test:** This stage of the V-model can be mapped to the activities performed in work packages WP3 (Green Energy Positive Tools), WP4 (Interoperability Gateway) and WP5 (Facility Management Environment). Once proper design of each component is performed
- **Testing:** Testing and validation of the whole system is divided in small steps that validate the results obtained for each of the stages described above. The main steps are:
 - Once a Hw/Sw component is developed (besides formal verification and validation activities (V&V) are performed during component development), at the testing stage a complete module is validated against formal requirements specifications and design documents. An example of this stage could be the testing and validation of the Green Energy Positive tools developed as modules or applications within OGEMA.
 - Once components or modules are validated, the next step is the system integration and validation. An example of this stage could be the testing and validation of OGEMA or FAME.
 - System acceptance is the last step of the testing stage and it implies the validation of the whole system once successfully deployed in each pilot site. The validation of the whole BEAMS system will be performed against the requirements document produced as a result of the work package WP1.

12.2 Documentation quality assurance

Besides describing at high level the methodology to be followed in order to assure the quality of the project results, it is also important to take into account quality issues when documenting the result of any design or development activity (and in particular software development activities).

Once the project requirements are gathered, the next step will be the design of all components of BEAMS system. Due to most development activities within BEAMS are related to software development, the specification and documentation of any software component should be done following well known standards such as UML.

The particular details regarding how each component or system design and documentation should be made are left for each work package leader. In any case, before any development activity start a common language should be agreed, and, in this case, due to the main activities of the project will involve software development, UML language is a good candidate.
